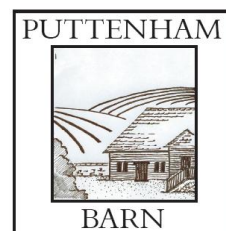


# PUTTENHAM BARN BUNKHOUSE

## STUDENTS FROM ACROSS THE POND ENJOY A UNIQUE EXPERIENCE

Led by Professor of Biology and veteran traveller James Godde, in May a group of 14 university students from Monmouth College, Illinois walked nearly 200 miles on the Winchester-to-Canterbury pilgrimage trail, to follow in the footsteps of the characters of Chaucer's Canterbury Tales written in the late 1300s. A restful night's stay at Puttenham Barn was appreciated by these intrepid souls.

Here are some extracts to give a taste of the trip:

*Before his group set out, Godde said it received a blessing at Winchester Cathedral. A brief about the pilgrimage reads, "You walk along yew tree-lined paths, over chalk grassland, through expansive meadows, ancient woodland and past babbling brooks, as well as churches, of course.*

*Upon reaching their destination for the day, the group would enjoy dinner at a local bar and grill, then stay, for the most part, in "OK-ish" hotels," said Godde. "One of the more adventurous places we stayed was a barn that had been converted into a bunkhouse. And the night before we reached Canterbury, we slept on the floor of a church. That was character building. It was not real plush. But I'm sure the students will all remember the night on the church floor."*

*"We visited three churches a day, on average," James said. "You get a little stamp in your pilgrim's passport at the churches. The students were really excited about that. More of the churches than not were open, and you could go in and use a stamp on a table.*

*Our longest day was 19 miles, and somewhere between that and 15 miles was pretty much the norm," said Godde. "They were troopers. I was very pleased that England doesn't warm up as quickly as we do. Most days were in the mid-60s, which is good walking weather. We got a little bit wet sometimes, but it was very doable. Near the end, it warmed up, and we hit the low 80s. That was pretty tasty."*

A memorable trip indeed for these young people!

## HAPPENINGS IN THE BARNYARD

### New electric bike charging station

Dave Williamson used his imagination and engineering skills to design and build this electric bike recharging station. Dave reports we were quoted nearly £5,000 for an off-the-shelf unit, so he made one for less than a fiver from a metal box someone had fly-tipped and free wood from various sources which included searching the Puttenham bonfire site.

Our neighbour Ruth kindly donated paint and Dave used a lot of the screws he had kept from when the old garden fence was replaced. So, a truly recycled and up-cycled facility. Great job, Dave!



### A bumper year for apples!



Wonderful early October colour in the barnyard – some of the abundant crop from our ‘Scarlet Nonpareil’ apple tree artistically arranged. Our visitors and barn neighbours are welcome to help themselves to these delicious fruits.

This beautiful variety of English dessert apple with juicy, sweet flesh was discovered in 1773 at an inn in Esher and received the Award of Merit from the Royal Horticultural Society in 1901.

In memory of his parents and following a lot of research on local varieties, volunteer and Trustee Chris Meeks organised the purchase of our two lovely apple trees as one-year-old saplings back in 2012.

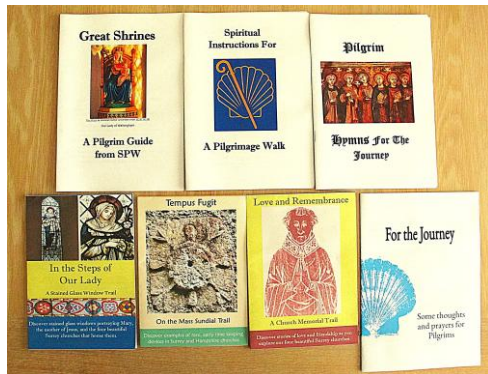

## TANNERS HATCH HOSTEL - FUTURE

As we go to press with this newsletter the future of Tanners Hatch, our neighbouring Hostel on the Polesden Lacey Estate, is “on the edge” as to whether it will survive into the future.

As many of you know, our Puttenham Project encouraged ‘Friends of Tanners Hatch’ to be formed, a group of YHA members with vision, imagination and determination who wish to see Tanners continue as a Hostel. Yet more than that, and importantly, they have between them a considerable spectrum of expertise including practical skills and knowledge of the building.

Although the Friends group prepared and submitted a professional Business Plan to YHA demonstrating how Tanners could be viable as a Hostel and managed effectively, the profoundly sad situation is that YHA then ignored the opportunity to work positively with them, instead deciding to surrender its lease back to the National Trust – thus abandoning one of their most iconic and much-loved hostels.



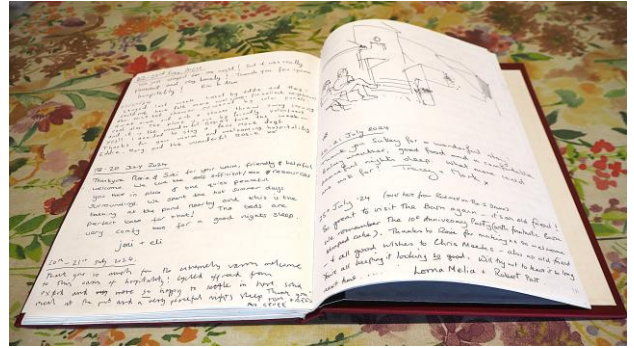
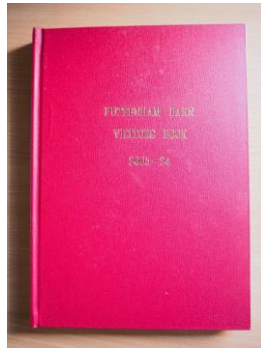
Undeterred, the Friends group recently submitted a formal ‘Expression of Interest’ to the Trust as part of what is now a bidding process for future use of the property; if successful, they envisage creating their own independent charity with a view to Hostel relaunch in 2026. We wish them well in this process and shall continue to give any support that we can to their amazing endeavours.

Tanners Hatch was originally found as a ruin, restored by YHA members and opened in 1947. That same spirit of adventure enabled us to open what is now Puttenham Barn Bunkhouse and remains alive amongst the YHA members who now form Friends of Tanners Hatch. Let us hope they, with our support, can go on to fulfil their dreams.
